Bread of Life, John Paschal- 182 people received food Boxes, We served a Meal every Saturday but Christmas day, we averaged between 40-60 people per Saturday. H3 -Dr. Hall- did 80 Patient visits. Extreme weather shelter: Outreach mission was able to take care of all who came to the Men's shelter- see their report. We had several groups give out coats, gloves, socks, outside at the Bread of

Life. We did have one big food delivery day where we shared with the Enrichment center, Hispanic ministries, Bread Basket, and other community partners.

Veteration, Gabrielle Saunders- We are in need of volunteers to assist with intake for our veteran clients. We are also looking for an enclosed trailer if anyone has one for sale.

Lee County Libraries, Brittany Newman- Lee County Library is open 9am-5pm Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; 9am-8pm Tuesday and Thursday; and 12pm-4pm on Saturday. Library cards are free to community members and can be applied for at the library. Computers are available for anyone to use with a library card or guest pass. Family Promise, Tamara Brogan- We are currently full at FP with 7 families on our waiting list. We are currently good with supplies.

Sandhills Center, Quiotti Ratliffe- Sandhills continues to work remotely with the option of working from the office per request. We continue our efforts to search for safe, affordable housing availability within our catchment areas. Please contact Brenda Goss Transition Housing Specialist @ 910-673-7773 should there be any private landlords or property managements, that are willing to provide affordable housing.

OMI, Hamer Carter- OMI served 40 clients in December, 22 men and 18 women. The Women's Shelter was under quarantine for approx. 14 days but was recovered on Jan 10th. OMI placed 7 clients back into stable housing, mainly through diversion, in December. The Adverse Weather Shelter process is currently in effect with shelter beds being filled first then overflow is directed to alternate sites.

OMI is currently recruiting for a new Director-Client Services and a Case Manager – Women's Shelter.

Current needs are bath towels, wash cloths and socks.

H3, Cindy Hall- H3 saw over 900 patients in 2021. The Piccolo blood testing machine has added another aspect to the outreach. Places clinics were held: Mrs. Wenger's parking lot, Navigation Center, BOLM, OMI Men's and Women's shelter, Haven, Depot Park, Cameron Grove Church, Prince Motel, Palamino Motel.

PIT Count, Cindy Hall- The PIT Count will be held on January 26th. Meet at First Baptist Church in the Fellowship Hall at 6:00 pm for training and then teams will be sent out. We are making 150 bags to hand

out to those experiencing homelessness. We need the following items which can be dropped off at First Baptist, The Buggy Factory, or Sanford Herald.

Hats and gloves

Small canned goods with pop tops (Beanie Weinees)

Granola Bars and snacks

Hygiene items (small shampoos, washcloth, deodorant, women's personal items such as tampons or pads, toothbrush and paste)

Small rolled fleece blankets

Handwarmers, Socks

Gently used winter coats of all sizes
